WHAT IS MASSACHUSETTS LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH TRAINING PROGRAM?

A collaboration between The Office of Local and Regional Health, Boston University, and The Hub Training Program. The Local Public Health Training Program is designed to prepare the local public health workforce for the needs of their communities. It is a 3-tiered approach which includes self-paced courses (Tier 1), instructor-led courses (Tier 2), and applied practice: Training Hub Program (Tier 3).
